

The Women's Studies Internship

Your education will make more sense as you get out of the classroom and into your life!

Our undergraduate internship program is designed to provide students with supervised work experience in the profession they are preparing to enter. Internships are available in a wide range of fields and are tailored to match each student's abilities and interests with the needs of a particular placement. Interns work 9-18 hours per week to receive 3-9 credits. Through this program students have the chance to develop skills and confidence with the support of a field supervisor and an academic coordinator.

Students from a broad range of backgrounds participate in this program, including those who are changing fields or are returning to work after a period of varied experience without pay. Through placements, students are able to expand their resumes, clarify their career goals and make contacts with potential employers.

In addition to the field placement, students are required to participate in a weekly three-hour, three-credit seminar. This integrative seminar is designed to provide students with a forum for situating their work experience within a broader context. A portion of each class is devoted to discussion in which insights gained from students' field experiences are viewed from the perspective of their academic training.


Why Major or Minor in Women's Studies?

Women's Studies Student Awards

All UCONN undergraduate students are eligible to compete for three annual awards.

Chase Going Woodhouse Prize:

- awarded to an undergraduate for an academic project that focuses on feminist concerns. This prize is named in honor of former Congresswoman and Director of the Women's Service Bureau. An activist and leader among the first generation of post-suffrage women in Connecticut, Chase Going Woodhouse provided an example of commitment to women's interests and to realizing feminist goals in practical politics. The Prize includes \$100.


Gladys Tantaquidgeon Award:

- presented to an undergraduate student whose academic and/or community work reflects a dedication to the understanding and advancement of women of color in the U.S. The award is named in honor of the Mohegan Indian medicine woman, anthropologist and community educator. Gladys Tantaquidgeon featured original scholarship on Eastern Native American culture through the Tantaquidgeon Indian Museum. In her leadership role and scholarly research she has highlighted the significance of Native American women's culture. The Award includes \$250.

Feminist Arts Award:

- given for the first time in 2002, it was established to recognize feminist visual, music, poetry, fiction, or film created by an undergraduate. This award was established to honor the wonderful outburst of feminist arts activity at UConn. The Award includes a \$50 prize.



The Women's Studies Program

The Women's Studies Program is a flexible interdisciplinary academic program devoted to the critical analysis of gender and the pursuit of knowledge about women. Combining the methods and insights of Women's Studies scholarship, our courses yield fresh perspectives which help us to understand the origins of and changes in diverse cultural and social arrangements. The Women's Studies major is broad as well as flexible, and the student's program can readily reflect individual interests or complement a second major.

Gender is a common thread in our curriculum, which interweaves issues of race, class, sexual orientation, ethnicity, age, ability, national origin and religion. The Women's Studies Program is committed to a vision that is truly international and cross-cultural. Without this perspective, our view of the world is profoundly impoverished and stereotypes will continue to distort our understanding.

The Program prepares students to employ critical learning in their private lives, in their public roles as citizens and as members of the work force, and enhances their ability to work with and for women to create a more humane society. Women's Studies fosters interdisciplinary breadth and critical thinking and thus opens the way to a wide variety of career choices and graduate programs. Women's Studies students are flourishing in social service agencies, business, law, education, and journalism, and employers appreciate the broad interdisciplinary perspective of Women's Studies education.

Requirements for the Women's Studies Major

Core Courses

Students are required to take the following:

- One 100/1000 level WS Introductory Course (WS 104/1104, WS 105/1105 or WS 124/1124)
- WS 265W/3265W – WS Research Methodology
- PHIL 218/3218 – Feminist Theory OR
- WS 250/3250 – Feminisms
- WS 261/3891 – WS Internship
- WS262/3894 – Intern Seminar
- WS 289W/4994W – Senior Seminar in WS

Supporting Courses

In addition to core courses, students are required to take five Supporting Courses.

Majors must complete at least 15 credits of 200/2000/3000 level courses that should be selected with the guidance of their faculty advisor. At least three of these courses will be Women's Studies or cross-listed courses. Two of the five supporting courses may include cross-referenced courses that cover special topics relevant to feminist scholarship in various departments. Such cross-referenced courses will be applied to the major with approval of the Program Director.

Related Courses

Students must take an additional 12 credits at the 200/2000/3000 level or above in fields closely related to the major. No required course in the major or in the related area may be taken pass/fail.



Requirements for the Women's Studies Minor

- Fifteen credit hours in Women's Studies and cross-listed courses, of which one course may be at the 100/1000 level.
- No more than two courses may be counted toward both the Major and the Minor.
- The Women's Studies Internship Program (WS 261/3891 and 262/3894) will count for a maximum of six credits toward the Minor.
- Students should contact the Women's Studies Program office for advising. Students must have the approval of their advisor and the Women's Studies Program Director.
